The ACGME is monitoring to ensure that residents have direct experience evaluating patients for the diagnoses listed above. Other diagnoses are not monitored. ICD-9 codes that are not listed should not be entered as they will be registered only as “other”.

If a diagnosis is not listed above, select the ICD-9 code that is closest to the actual diagnosis or that is the highest on the differential diagnosis.

EXAMPLE: A patient is evaluated for chronic cough and the cause is found to be gastric reflux. If an asthma work-up was performed as part of the evaluation, that patient may coded as “Asthma,” using ICD-9 code “493.”

The main diagnosis should be entered as the “Principle Diagnosis.” If other co-existing Allergy/Immunology diagnoses were also evaluated, it is important to enter them as well. They will be registered as a “Secondary Diagnosis.”

ACGME CASE LOG ENTRY SYSTEM GENERAL INTRUCTIONS

Instructions for entering a patient encounter:

1. Go to **www.acgme.org** and click “**Residents**” on the top section of the webpage.
2. Click “**Login**” under the section titled “**Resident Case Log System.**”
3. A new window will pop-up, enter User ID and password.
4. Click “**Case Entry**” on the top section of the webpage.
5. Click “**Add**” on the next page.
6. Using the pull-down menus, select the appropriate “**Attending**,” “**Institution**,” “**Case Type**,” and “**Setting**.”
 (Note: Under “Setting,” a “New Patient” is a patient that is new to the *resident*, not new to the clinic/practice.)
7. Enter the correct **date** (the default is the current date).
8. Enter the proper **ICD-9 diagnosis code** in the “ICD9 Code” box using the directions printed below, and click the “**Select**” button. Multiple codes can be added one at a time.
9. The ICD-9 code and the corresponding diagnosis will appear under the “Selected ICD9 Codes” box. In this box, click on the ICD-9 code that is the **principle diagnosis**, and click the checkbox “Principle.”
10. Click the “**Save**” button to save the case entry.

DIAGNOSIS and PROCEDURE codes may be entered as follows:

On the “Case/Encounter Entry” Page, click the “Search” button. A pop-up box will appear. Using the pull-down menu next to “Area,” select whether to search for a “Diagnosis” or a “Procedure.” Use the pull-down menu next to “Type” to select the diagnosis or procedure.

(Note: Do not search by typing a keyword next to “ICD-9 Desc.” because the entry might not be counted properly.)

DIAGNOSIS codes may also be entered as follows:

On the “Case/Encounter Entry” Page, type one of the ICD-9 codes exactly as it is found on the back of this quick reference card in the “ICD-9 Code” box, then click the “Select” button.

If the ICD-9 code is not entered in the one of these two ways, there is a risk that the patient will not be properly counted.
